Because I have such ill will towards bananas, would it be wrong for me to proselytize my preference? Should I teach that bananas are evil and consuming them is a sin? I would sure hope that those receiving that message would dismiss me as a nutjob and not take my antibananaism to heart.

While I am free to hate bananas, I am not free to force that view on others. There is no moral authority to my belief. It is my personal preference.

There is much in Christianity that has been taught as from God when it is really just a matter of personal preference. Some of these teachings have morphed into traditions and are accepted as essential when they are not. Take for example Sunday church. This is a tradition built on a preference. The Sabbath is Saturday. In Acts, people met every day of the week. Someone standing in front of a group of people teaching was adapted from the Greeks. Nowhere in the scriptures will you find that this is the role of a pastor. It is a preference that rolled

into a tradition that has become the norm.

Meeting in a building is another preference. The churches in the New Testament met in homes. There is nothing morally wrong with these things. There is something terribly wrong with teaching that these are essential to our faith when they are not.

When I was a kid, the church that my parents took me to had a strong stance against going to movies. It

was something that was taught as wrong. Most people in the church, including the pastor, had VCRs. It was okay to rent movies. It was wrong to see them in the theater. This was absurd and hypocritical. It was also built on someone's personal preference.
